Research about how much children lose ground over the summer is well documented. Parents and guardians can encourage their children to have a summer of fun *and* learning with these great websites. Check them out!

ReadWriteThink.org: Some ideas to build reading and writing skills are: (1) watching TV with the sound off and closed captioning on; (2) reading directions for how to play a new game; or (3) helping with meals by writing up a grocery list, finding things in the grocery store, and reading the recipe aloud for mom or dad during cooking time. PBSkids.org/zoom/activities: Encourage your child to become an active citizen. Kids who participate in community service activities gain not only new skills but self-confidence and self-esteem. Resources from ZOOM can help them get the most out of helping others this summer.

Get in on the latest outdoor craze with geocaching, where families search for hidden "caches" or containers using handheld GPS tools (or a GPS app on your smart phone). Got a Newspaper? You've Got Learning Just a few pages from your newspaper can be turned into

lots of early learning activities. Here you'll find "letters

and words" activities for the youngest, plus fun writing prompts and tips on how to read and analyze the news for older kids. Grab your child and let's get learning with a newspaper!

Letters and Words: Have your child cut out the letters needed to spell his first and last name. Have him glue these onto a piece of paper. Ask your child to find capital and lower case pairs of letters. Glue the pairs onto a piece of paper. Ask your child to find and cut out all the words in headlines that she can read. Paste them on a piece of paper and practice reading them together.

Writing: Cut out a few pictures from the paper. Ask your child to write a caption for each one. Compare their caption with the paper's caption. Talk about ways captions help readers understand one small piece of the story. Ask your child to circle all the ads they can find in the paper. Discuss what makes a good advertisement and what does not. Discover what types of words and punctuation are often used in ads, and how those are tools writers use to capture a reader's attention.

<u>Understanding the News:</u> Help your child understand the structure of the newspaper. Sort news stories into international, national, and local. Point out other sections such as sports, food and entertainment. Talk about the difference between fact and opinion. Then, read one of the articles from the newspaper. Are there facts in the story? Are there any opinions? How can we tell the difference? What sorts of words are used for each? Within which section are opinion stories usually found? Choose an interesting and age-appropriate story from the newspaper. Read the story with your child. After reading, ask your child if she can answer the "who, what, where, when, and why" questions about the story.

Homelessness doesn't go away with the end of a school year - McKinney-Vento

If your family lives in any of the following situations:

- 1 In a shelter;
- 2 In a motel or campground due to the lack of an alternative adequate accommodation;
- 3 In a car, park, abandoned building or bus or train stations;
- 4 Doubled up with other people due to loss of housing or economic hardship.

Your school-age children may quality for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney-Vento Act. If you believe your children may be eligible, contact Gina Meadows, Homeless Liaison at 770-266-4508 to find out what services and supports may be available. There may also be supports available for your preschool-age children.

Permissive Transfer Option Available May 1, 2014 - June 30, 2014 Walton County School District

Parents or guardians may elect to send a child to another public school in the same school district as long as there is classroom space available. If parents/guardians elect to exercise this choice option, the parents/guardians assume all costs associated with transporting the children to and from the selected school. Students who transfer to another school using this option may, at their election, continue to attend such school until all grades of the school are completed. After that time, the students will be required to return to their home school. Please visit
